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

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President's Address

If you have been binging TV like I have in these winter months, then hopefully you've caught The Tinder Swindler on Netflix. I can describe this documentary in two words: Jaw. Drop.

The show depicts stories of multiple women who were conned out of thousands of dollars by a man they trusted; a man each of these women thought they would be happily married to for the rest of their lives. These women were taken advantage of because they were looking for something we all need: strong, trusting relationships. While we don't deal in nuptials, we each rely on creating and maintaining strong relationships for our practices to be successful.

Some of these relationships are with internal team members and patients; some are with external entities who are brought into the practice as needed. Unbeknownst to us, some of these companies are swindlers. Do you remember the Stericycle situation? I had just started practicing. I trusted the companies chosen

by my predecessor. I kept getting bills that increased every month from Stericycle. After some calls, I found out that I was involved in a contract I couldn't get out of. Fortunately, a class action lawsuit was filed and there was a settlement. I have made other mistakes by blindly trusting companies, either because I was too lazy or too busy to do enough research.

I have found it helpful to reach out to other dentists to vet companies and opportunities. As one example, in January, I began researching companies to negotiate PPO fees. After some initial friendly meetings, I asked for a list of references. One of the references was a name I recognized as someone I met through the Ohio Dental Association, though I could not (and still cannot) remember exactly how we met. In any event, I emailed her, apologized for not remembering how we met, and asked about her experience with the company with which I was

speaking. She replied within an hour and said she had a negative experience with this company. As a result, I will not be working with them. Connecting with this dentist through the ODA--and sending her one email--saved me thousands of dollars (and likely several headaches).

This member doctor made a mistake in who she did business with. She did not allow me to do the same. This is the benefit of connecting with association members: we want everyone to be successful. By working together--whether that means extensive committee participation or just sending one email-- we can avoid getting swindled.

I have found it helpful to reach out to other dentists to vet companies and opportunities.


Spring is in the air. Or is it?

December 6, 2021 Council Meeting Minutes

Call To Order:

The sixth 2021 Council Meeting was held Monday, December 6, 2021 in person. President Dr. John Bennet Jr. called the Council Meeting to order at 6:54 pm. The Order of Business and the CDS Mission and Antitrust Statements were presented to Council prior to the order of business via email from Executive Director Ms. Vicki Nixon.

Roll Call:

Members Present: Drs. Bennet Jr, Brandt, Chopra, Dagher, Dorr, Heck, Murphy, Osterday, Perrino, Poole, Wauligman, Wessel and Yauss.

Members Absent: Drs. Kelley, Khetarpal, Newby, Parker, Stadiem, and Schaeffer.

Executive Director Ms. Vicki Nixon present.

A quorum was present. The September 13th and November 8th minutes were presented. No changes were requested.

President's Report by Dr. John Bennet, Jr:

- Dr. Bennet requested two Council members to volunteer for the Honors Nominating Committee. Drs. Murphy and Poole volunteered. Their nominations were approved unanimously.
- Regarding the ODA Call for Nominations with one position to the Council on Dental Care
 Programs and Dental Practice, the Membership Services Committee, and another for the Ohio
 State Dental Board, Vicki requested to let her know by December 31st if interested. The
 nominee to the Membership Services Committee is requested to be from a large group practice.
- The American Dental Association has positions open on the Council of Communications and Membership and the Council on Dental Accreditation (CODA). These are due February 24th.

Treasurer's Report by Dr. Chris Heck:

• Dr. Heck, chair of the Finance Committee, reported on highlights of the last Committee meeting on November 15th. It is anticipated there will be a higher level of non-dues paying members. Additional funds are needed for extra seminars. No decision has been made yet on the directory. The question is to print it or make it a PDF file. In the budget this line item will stay in suspense for 2022. Likewise there could be some income from completing it in 2022. There is a budget of \$4,000 for a recruitment event. Staff costs and implementation of credit card payment system will increase costs. It is hard to predict how the financial markets will affect our investments. Dr. Heck made the motion to approve our 2022 budget. Seconded by Dr. Murphy, it was approved unanimously.

Executive Director's Report by Vicki Nixon:

- Ms. Nixon reported the new website is now up and running. She anticipates a few tweaks along the way. One hundred seventy-five members responded so far to the request to establish a username and password to see events and pay fees online. A spread sheet is being made to the software company for set-up.
- The CDS's New Year's Celebration and Awards Dinner will be January 7, 2022 at The Transept, an old church named St John's Unitarian in the stained-glass window and located next to Music Hall. It is \$75 per person and includes appetizers, a duet meal and two drink tickets. A professional photographer will be present and Big Daddy Walker will provide the entertainment.
- Next year, 2022, represents the last year of the biennium for assistants to renew their radiograph certificates. Ms. Nixon asked for Council's opinion to have this course next summer and Council was in favor.

CDS Committee Updates:

- CDS Oral Health Foundation: Dr. Brandt reported the new Veterans Administration Director will contact New York University, Harvard and Columbia about their veterans' donated care programs that are similar to ours. They just started their programs. Mr. Graham, our ADA lobbyist, will get copies from the Veterans Administration to learn what they can do to help us find qualifying patients. He will contact NYU to learn more about their program in order to help explain our needs to the new VA Director. Our "Leave No Vet Behind" Program has completed about \$1.5 million in donated care to date. We have a partnership with Dr. Kim Oberlander of the Cincinnati Health Network Dental Center, formerly the McMicken Dental Clinic, to see qualifying veterans from that area. The Foundation reimburses the Health Network 40% of their fees. Other free services are provided by the dentists who volunteer in the home areas of other veterans. The "Jack W. Gottschalk, D.D.S. Notable Service Award" event will be held April 1, 2022 at the Kenwood Country Club. There will be two honorees.
- Finance: Dr. Heck previously reported at the beginning of this meeting.
- Membership Committee: Dr. Rick Yauss reported the Committee has set up a recruitment event on April 28, 2022 at Fueled Collective. Dr. Bronson from the ADA, Dr. Chopra from the ODA, and Dr. Khetarpal, and Ms. Nixon from the CDS will present their views to non-members. The event is titled "Eat, Drink and Get Trivial", with the trivia questions about the ADA, ODA and CDS. Ms. Nixon is working on a grant from the ODA. Other social events are on hold. A new CDS member is Dr. Tara Aboumahboub. She is a Tufts University graduate from 2021. (Please welcome her warmly into our Society. Secretary's note.)
- Program Committee: No report currently.

ODA Updates:

- Access to Dental Care: Dr. Poole reported the council's meeting with a representative of Ohio Medicaid and changes that are expected to take place within the program in 2022.
- Council on Dental Care Programs and Dental Practice: The council met with representatives of Delta Dental of Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana and Dental Care Plus Group/DentaQuest regarding numerous items, including reimbursement levels and past interactions and concerns that Ohio dentists have had with both companies. The ODA's Dental Insurance Working Group continues to assist individual ODA members who submit questions, concerns, complaints to the ODA on matters with insurance companies that they are unable to resolve on their own. The council is working to develop a resolution for submission to the 2022 ODA House of Delegates that would appropriately fund a dental benefit issues education program directed at ODA members, their staff and dental students using brochures, seminars, the ODA website, etc. that ultimately assists dentists and their staff in educating patients/subscribers and employers about dental benefit issues. The council conducted an extensive discussion of the manpower issues affecting Ohio dentists, data related to the matter, possible ways to address the situation and developed recommendations for the ODA Dental Education and Licensure Committee to consider as it addresses Resolution 13-21 (Establishment of a Workforce Working Group). The council is continuing to monitor the activities of the Ohio State Dental Board. The council developed a prioritize listing of the ODA's dental insurance related policy statements for the ODA Executive Committee to consider as it implements the ODA's legislative agenda.
- Executive Committee/Finance: Dr. Chopra reported on legislative activity the ODA is involved in at the Statehouse. House Bill 344 deals with non-covered services and has been heard in the House Insurance committee. Senate Bill 166 allows for another avenue for certified dental assistants. The telehealth bills currently in the legislature do not include dentistry due to the teledentistry law already in place in Ohio. Some clear tray aligner companies have tried to amend telehealth bills to include dentistry but have been unsuccessful.

Dr. Chopra reported Medicaid reimbursement is contracted at 39-40% of average fees. Unless the reimbursement goes to 65%, Medicaid recipients will see no change in their level of care and finding someone to provide that care. The State of Connecticut raised their reimbursement rate high enough that more dentists signed on to see Medicaid patients. Then the state lowered the reimbursement rate back down.

March 18-19 will be the Leadership Institute at the Hilton Polaris. This is the same weekend as the Hinman Meeting in Georgia. The student lobbying day will be set in May.

- ODA Membership: Dr. Yauss reported that at the November 19th meeting the renewal and retention rates for 2021 will come out in February. President Dr. Tom Kelly, Dr. Kyle Bogan and David Owsiany are trying to come up with a way for young, new members to join. They often are getting into large practices. Can organized dentistry create a group membership category? A dental group could pay one rate to include all dentist members within it. Enticements such as disability insurance may help them keep paying dues when they leave to keep the insurance. Dr. Grace Eichler is a new member on his Council.
- ODA Foundation Board: No report.
- *ODPAC*: No report.

ADA UPDATES:

Council on Dental Practice: Dr. Chopra reported the new leadership at the ADA, Executive
Director Dr. Raymond Cohlmia, with his background as a practicing dentist and dean of the
University of the Oklahoma School of Dentistry, understands business models to help younger
members to join organized dentistry.

Old Business/New Business:

None.

First Course Description

The history of clinical diagnosis began in earnest from the enlightened days of Hippocrates in ancient Greece but is far from perfect despite the enormous bounty of information made available by medical research including the sequencing of the human genome. The practice of diagnosis continues to be dominated by theories set down in the early 1900s. The word "diagnosis" is derived from Greek, and it is literally translated "through knowledge." Diagnoses do not come about by "blinding flashes of brilliance" but instead are arrived at methodically through the systematic and disciplined application of knowledge. This half-day presentation is designed to reacquaint the oral health care provider with common mucosal presentations. There is an axiomatic principle that governs clinical practice - "common things occur commonly." According to a recent study, there are a handful of relatively common oral mucosal presentations that comprise almost three-quarters of oral lesions for which patients seek consultation. This course will provide a review and clinical update of those commonly encountered pathologic entities as well as the deployment of the appropriate treatment algorithm. Clinical presentations from aphthae to zoster will be covered to improve the clinician's comfort level in diagnosing and managing these.

Learning Objectives

Participants should be able to:

- 1. Expand your clinical diagnostic algorithm.
- 2. Correlate oral presentations with systemic possibilities.
- 3. Expand your treatment algorithm.

Second Course Description

While some think this is a rare cancer, mouth cancers will be newly diagnosed in about 132 new individuals each day in the US alone, and a person dies from oral cancer every hour of every day. The oropharynx is one of the most common sites of head and neck cancer in the United States. It is estimated that 11,000-13,000 new cases of oropharyngeal cancer are diagnosed in the United States each year. Most of these tumors are squamous cell carcinoma, a cancer which arises from squamous epithelial cells which line the upper aerodigestive tract. Males are more than four times as likely as females to develop oropharyngeal squamous cell carcinoma (OPSCC), with an overall annual risk of 6.2 per 100,000 men compared to 1.4 cases per 100,000 women. Incidence in the U.S. is highest among white and black men, and lower among Hispanics, Native Americans, and Asians/ Pacific Islanders. Despite decreasing rates of tobacco and alcohol use, the rates of oropharyngeal cancer have trended steadily upward for the last decade. This is primarily due to the increase in cancers related to infection with the human papilloma virus (HPV). The time lag between an oral HPV infection and the development of HPV-related oropharyngeal cancer is estimated at between 15 and 30 years. Unfortunately, at this time, the majority are found as late-stage cancers, and this accounts for the extremely high death rate of about 43% at five years from diagnosis (for all stages and etiologies combined at time of diagnosis), and high treatment related morbidity in survivors. This course is designed to review the pathophysiology of oropharyngeal cancer and emerging trends in cancer management.

Learning Objectives

- 1. Identify the most common etiologies of oral cancer and its incidence within the population.
- 2. Review the basic histology of the oral mucosa and the changes that occur with premalignant and malignant lesions and their patterns of occurrence.
- 3. Review current treatment recommendations and clinical outcomes.
- 4. Review the principles of and the complications from radiotherapy.
- 5. Discuss the developing role of immunotherapy in the management of late-stage tumors.

About the Speaker

Dr. Gonzales was recently selected to serve as the Executive Director of the American College of Dentists. In 2013, she retired from the United States Army Dental Corps after a long and distinguished career in active federal service to this Nation. Prior to her retirement, she was a nominative selection as the Director of Strategic Communications for the Army Surgeon General. She has commanded formations in Europe, the Middle East, and the United States. Dr. Gonzales graduated Magna Cum Laude from the College of Charleston with a B.S. in Chemistry and received her D.M.D. from the Medical University of South Carolina. Colonel Gonzales began her military career at Fort Jackson, South Carolina as a resident in the Advanced Education in General Dentistry program. She then completed a residency training program in oral and maxillofacial pathology in 1992 at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda. In 2006, she completed a two-year fellowship in Orofacial Pain at the Naval Postgraduate Dental School and completed a Master of Science in Health Care from George Washington University in Washington, DC.

Dr. Gonzales has earned Fellowship status with the American Academy of Oral & Maxillofacial Pathology, the American Academy of Oral Medicine, and the Academy of General Dentistry. She is a Diplomate of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology and the American Board of Orofacial Pain. She holds Diplomate status as well as with the American Board of Forensic Examiners and the American Board of Forensic Medicine. She is a Fellow of both the American College and International College of Dentists. Dr. Gonzales's diverse professional background includes tours as staff assigned to Oral Surgery, Hanau, Germany, Force Dental Surgeon, Multinational Peace Keeping Force in El Gorah, Egypt as well as Chief, of Oral and

Maxillofacial Pathology, Walter Reed Army Medical Center, and William Beaumont Army Medical Center. Dr. Gonzales has authored over fifty scientific publications in peer-reviewed journals and was the recipient of the International College of Dentists Award for Excellence in Research. She has received the Order of Military Medical Merit and the Surgeon General's A designator for clinical excellence. She graduated with distinction from the United States Army War College in 2008. Theresa is also a Professor of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology at the Medical University of South Carolina- James B. Edwards College of Dental Medicine.

Orofacial pain syndromes are often seen in health care settings. TMJ disorders are often seen in patient with migraine. Both can be disabling; however, migraine continues to be under-diagnosed and under-treated. How long do I have to keep my dental charts?

The Supreme Court of Ohio recently upheld the constitutionality of the state's four-year statute of repose in medical and dental malpractice actions. A statute of repose is a provision that sets a time frame in which a legal right extinguishes. In other words, the statute of repose places an effective time limitation on when dental malpractice suits may be filed against a treating dentist. Ohio's statute of repose bars actions filed more than four years after the date of treatment, except in the case of those patients who are mentally infirm and with minors, in which case the four years begins to run upon emancipation.

Dentists had previously been instructed to retain patient records indefinitely to aid in the defense of a lawsuit. However, this favorable court ruling may help relieve dentists' record-keeping burden. There may be circumstances where a dental office must maintain records for a certain period of time; for instance, the retention requirement for Medicaid records (6 years) and Medicare records (7 years). Participating provider agreements also generally specify record retention requirements, as well as many professional liability insurance agreements. Dentists are encouraged to obtain guidance from legal counsel and their malpractice insurer prior to the disposal of any patient records and to seek guidance on establishing a new record retention policy.



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
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
