In 1921, White Castle opened the first fast food restaurant in the United States. By the 1950s the fast-food revolution was booming with busy families wanting to eat in front of their new TVs without having to cook. Businesses were born to be fast in America. We are trained to find ways to do things faster than our peers. Benjamin Franklin said, "Remember that time is money." Every business owner knows this evergreen statement to be true. The business of dentistry is not an exception: the faster

I can do a filling, the more money I can make.

This concept doesn't quite hold true when we talk about esthetic or surgical dentistry where we slow down the process. Treatments like full arch implant cases are typically more time consuming because they require planning with colleagues, dental labs, and multiple appointments with the patient. However, there are companies that say they can do these procedures faster and cheaper. So, who is the fast food of dentistry? Snap on Smile, owned by DentMat,

offers dentists an option for full arch temporaries at a low cost. Smile Direct Club, which offers orthodontics directly to consumers, has been around since 2014 and is worth a half a billion dollars. I recently saw a new company, Pop On Veneers, on my Facebook feed. I was horrified by their advertisement but couldn't look away. You can get "top and bottom veneers," within a week, for \$549! How can we compete? We can increase efficiencies within our practice that give a direct

benefit to our patient. Text message confirmations, two-way messaging, digital scanning and milling, continuing education, and 3D printers are all ways that we can stay relevant in the fast-paced world.

In some ways, we just can't compete. If someone wants to use Smile Direct Club, we will not be able

to change their minds. What we can do is stay informed about these businesses so that we can intelligently educate our patients on their benefits, their limitations, and how they may affect our patients' long-term goals. If necessary, we can part ways with patients who do not fit our practice philosophy. We can also set better expectations for ourselves. I know that I cannot make every patient happy, I cannot provide every service possible, and I cannot give away my services for free. If you can set up boundaries and manage your

own expectations, then you can continue to practice dentistry the way you want. There will always be the new fast food of dentistry, we just need to learn to live with it while controlling what we can in order to run the best business possible.

Call to Order: President, Dr. Ruchika Khetarpal, called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm.

Roll Call:

Members Absent: Hanlon, Parker, and Poole.
Special Guest: Dr. Steve Moore and Dr. David Vorherr, Keely Dental Society.
Executive Director Present: Vicki Nixon

A quorum was present. The April Council Meeting Minutes were unanimously approved as posted.

Guests Presents:

Dr. David Vorherr presented a Resolution approved by the membership of Keely Dental Society, which they plan to submit for ODA House approval regarding a name change from Keely Dental Society to Keely Dental Society of Southwestern Ohio. Since Southwestern Ohio includes two counties (Clermont and Hamilton) that are part of the Cincinnati Dental Society's jurisdiction, CDS Council suggested that Keely consider renaming their society to "Keely Dental Society of Butler County" to better identify the jurisdiction of Keely. Dr. Vorherr and Dr. Moore appreciated the discussion and will take this suggestion back to their membership.

President's Report: Dr. Ruchika Khetarpal

- The following ODA Council positions are up for renewal and each CDS member wishes to renew for another term: Access to Dental Care (Dr. Oberlander), Dental Care Programs and Dental Practice (Dr. Heck), and Membership Services (Dr. Eichler).
- The policy on "ODA and ADA Delegate and Alternate Delegate" prepared by the task force (Drs. Bennet, Heck, Kelley, Khetarpal, and Schaeffer) was presented for discussion. Slight changes were made and a motion by Khetarpal was made to accept these changes to the new policy, second by Heck, all were in favor. Vicki will make the changes and distribute to Council via email. This policy will be discussed at the Cincinnati's Subdistrict 9 meeting on August 15, 2022.

Treasurer's Report: Dr. Monica Newby

The 2021 IRS 990 tax return (first page only) was distributed to Council. The Finance Committee approved the 990 and requests that Council approve for filing to the IRS. Dr. Wauligman asked the reason for the large surplus. Two main reasons for this surplus; fewer expenses than budgeted and the receipt of the PPP loan, which was forgiven. Dr. Newby made a motion to file the approved 2021 IRS 990, second by Wauligman, all in favor.

Executive Director's Report: Vicki Nixon

- The annual shredding event was a success, and we appreciate the support of Brian Bartish, Attorney-Founder of Kybernan Legal Solutions. He is interested in supporting our event again next year.
- The 2023 Continuing Education booklet will be ready for distribution to our members by August 1st.
- It is Vicki's hope that she can begin working on the revised Membership Directory soon, however, with a temporary personal leave of her assistant, this may need to be pushed into August. Based on the survey, about 50% of the members wish to receive the directory electronically, the balance in hard copy.

CDS Committee updates:

Oral Health Foundation: Dr. Ken Brandt

- We are still waiting for a final meeting with the VA to determine if they will be able to assist us with identifying veterans that need our "Leave No Vet Behind" program. Our annual screening for 2022 is

November 12th at Crest Smile Shoppe. Vicki sent out volunteer opportunities to our members and will follow-up with another email in the next month.

 The "Jack W. Gottschalk, DDS Notable Service Award ceremony was well attended, and all recipients were incredibly happy to be recognized for their efforts.

Finance: Reported above.

Membership: Dr. Rick Yauss

- The "Think, Eat, and Get Trivial" recruitment event went well, and we came under budget. However, the outcome was not as the task force anticipated. We had 4 non-members attend by personal invitation, out of over 100 non-members that were sent an invitation. Moving forward, the committee decided to focus their energy on inviting non-members to CDS Member Events (personal invite) and encouraging new members to become more involved by attending more CDs Member Events and CDS Socials (personal invite as well).
- As of May 18, 2022, there are 42 non-renewals, which 60% are full active members. This directly impacts our dues income of close to \$12,000.
- New members presented: Ronald Freeman, Deanna LeCroix, Vinella Redla, Christine Shi, and Tyler Thompson, 4 are from group practices.
- Our "Speedy CE-Modern Topics in Dentistry" event is scheduled for October 17, 2022 at Fueled Collective and we are close to being able to market this event.
- CDS Socials are starting up again with the next one June 16, 2022 at Brink Brewery, hosted by Drs. Brandt, Dorr, and Yauss. Vicki will prepare a new member contact list and distribute to the committee and Council in hopes they may personally invite a new member or any member to this event. Dr. Michael Vieth will be hosting the August social and Dr. Grace Eichler the November social.

- The Ohio State Dental Board currently has no executive director, no attorney and three open board member seats.
- The council is submitting resolutions to the 2022 ODA HOD to create an ODA policy on dental benefit subscriber identification and to update the ODA's policy on pre-existing conditions
- Dentists are encouraged to maintain good patient records, including any implant systems they utilize.


Subcouncil on Diversity: Dr. Ruchika Khetarpal

"Common Oral Pathologies" By: Deepak Krishnan, DDS

Participants will learn: What to look for • What to manage • When to Refer

The oral cavity often presents with a myriad of diseases – inflammatory, metabolic, endocrine, and neoplastic. It is imperative to establish a diagnosis to properly manage these lesions. Some of these lesions require expertise beyond the dental office for both diagnosis and management. 
