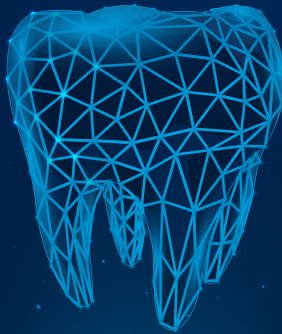

First Course Description

“Clicks, Pops, and Headaches: TMJ Management in the Private Office”

TMD cases have the stigma of being tricky. Not necessarily because they are hard to treat, but because the signs and symptoms can present in so many different ways thus making treatment options more confusing to navigate. This course is designed to simplify TMD cases into categories that will lead to more strategic and successful treatment decisions.

Learning Objectives:

- Identify occlusal factors that can contribute to orofacial pain.
- Identify joint vs. muscle-related TMD issues.
- Understand and implement a stepwise TMJ evaluation.
- Manage acute TMD emergencies.
- Work through a decision tree to properly select occlusal guard design and material.
- Consider combination treatment modalities for TMD management.

Second Course Description

“Dental Acid Erosion”: The Body’s Cry for Help”

Dental clinicians are often one of the first to identify a patient at risk of the harmful effects of an oral-systemic acidic environment. Having the ability to find these sometimes-asymptomatic presentations puts us in an opportunistic position to help our patients not only identify and manage oral complications of acid erosion but also encourage them to take steps to heal the rest of their body. This course will provide insightful pearls on identifying, educating, and treating patients with acid erosion.

Learning Objectives:

- Understand the etiologies of dental acid erosion.
- Educate patients on unexpected low pH levels of certain foods and drinks.
- Identify the difference between other etiologies or enamel loss.
- Properly manage erosion cases in your practice.
- Educate patients on potential underlying systemic conditions associated with dental acid erosion. occlusal factors that can contribute to orofacial pain.

About the Speaker

Dr. Courtney Brady is a Massachusetts native having grown up on the beaches of Cape Cod. Her fervor for diagnosing and treating TMD began early in her career when she was afforded the opportunity to learn firsthand from Dr. Peter Dawson and other likeminded mentors during her residency at The University of Florida's AEGD. She continues to hone her skills with countless hours of continuing education from world renowned speakers and mentors.

Dr. Brady has served on many committees with both the Academy of General Dentistry and the Massachusetts Dental Society including a 4-year term for the National AGD's President and has lectured on both a local and national level including the Yankee Dental Congress and Hinman Dental Society. She is in private practice in Wellesley, MA where she focuses on comprehensive care that hinges on occlusions, TMD therapy, and esthetics.

First Course Description

**“Smile Esthetics and The Importance of the Gingival Framework: From Gummy Smile
to Long in the Tooth”**

A smile is a universal greeting and translates into all languages! Smiling individuals are judged as more pleasant and trustworthy and the act of smiling actually released endorphins that improve the mood of the person who smiles! Psychologists and scientists agree that the simple act of a smile can positively transform a person’s life, as well as the lives of others. Hence, the smile can be considered a critical component to one’s overall happiness and is fundamental to perceived beauty. As dentists, we are trained to create, maintain, and protect the ideal smile, but what should our goals be in achieving that “gold standard” of beauty?

The essential components of an ideal smile involve the relationship between three primary components: the teeth, the lip framework, and the gingival scaffold. While beauty may be in the eye of the beholder, factors that allow assessment of overall smile esthetics include tooth width/height ratio, shape, position, quality of restoration, and general arrangement of the dentition, especially of the anterior teeth, upper lip position, buccal corridor, visibility of teeth, and amount of gingival display. These factors are considered in concert and usually judged esthetically as a group, in terms harmony. It is considered that in the composition of a beautiful smile, the form, balance, symmetry, and relationship of these elements make it attractive or unattractive. This course seeks to present the current data regarding ideal smile components and highlight the importance of gingival architecture in the creation of a personalized road map and help their patients achieve a vibrant smile.

Learning Objectives:

- List the components of a smile and discuss their role in optimal smile esthetics
- Assess the importance of the gingival and soft tissue framework in achieving an esthetic smile.

- Understand the role of patient-based characteristics on acceptable esthetics and ideal smile components.
- Discuss personalized treatment options to achieve ideal smile esthetics based upon underlying diagnoses in each patient.

Second Course Description

“Up in Smoke: Smoking, Vaping, Cannabis Use and Oral Health”

It is well-established that cigarette smoking is a significant risk factor in the development of gingivitis, periodontitis, and peri-implant diseases. While cigarette smoking rates have been declining among both adults and high school-aged children over the past 25 years, the use of e-cigarettes or vaping as well as the state-wide legalization of cannabis has increased these methods of consumption rapidly over the last decade.

E-cigarettes are disproportionately used by young people. Current epidemiologic studies suggest that while only 2.8% of adults use e-cigarettes, 10.5% of middle school students and 27.5% of high school students report using e-cigarettes at least once in the last month. Given the high prevalence of e-cigarette use amongst young people and the lack of significant scientific evidence on the risks that they may pose to oral health, it is critical that dental professionals are aware of current patterns of use and the risks that tobacco products, including cigarettes and vaping products, pose to oral health.

Cannabis is the most frequently used psychotropic drug in the United States and the second-most commonly used mind-altering substance, after alcohol. In 2018, more than 11.8 million young adults report marijuana use in the last year and 35.7% of 12th graders reported using marijuana in the last 12 months. Cannabis smoking is associated with periodontal diseases, xerostomia, leukoplakia, and an increased risk of mouth and neck cancers. While cannabis use remains illegal federally, states increasingly are legalizing cannabis use, and dental healthcare providers must understand the consequences of cannabis use on oral health and the implications of providing treatment to individuals who report cannabis use.

Learning Objectives:

- Review the current scientific evidence related to the effects of tobacco, nicotine, and cannabis use on periodontal, peri-implant, and oral health.
- Understand current epidemiologic trends in cigarette, e-cigarette, and cannabis use in the United States and worldwide.
- Assess the challenges in providing dental care to patients who are current or former cigarette, e-cigarette, and cannabis users.
- Enable dental professionals to best counsel their patients on tobacco cessation, including the risks and/or benefits of using e-cigarettes as a tobacco cessation tool.

Dr. Geisinger received her BS in Biology from Duke University, her DDS from Columbia University School of Dental Medicine, and her MS and Certificate in Periodontology and Implantology from the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio. Dr. Geisinger is a Diplomate in the American Board of Periodontology and a Fellow in the International Team for Implantology, the International College of Dentists and the American College of Dentists. She has served as the President of the American Academy of Periodontology Foundation, as the Chair of the American Dental Association's Council on Scientific Affairs, as a member of the Board of Directors of the American Dental Association Science and Research Institute, and on multiple national and regional organized dentistry committees. She currently serves as the Immediate Past President of the American Academy of Periodontology and on numerous AAP and ADA committees and task forces. She has authored over 75 peer-reviewed publications and serves on the editorial board of several publications. Her research interests include periodontal and systemic disease interaction, implant dentistry in the periodontally compromised dentition, and novel treatment strategies for oral soft and hard tissue regeneration. - Be better prepared to treat a patient who suffers a sport related dental injury, including fractured and avulsed teeth.
- Learn about different types of mouth-guards and which ones to use.

About the Speaker

Dr. Maron attended Emory University Dental School and residency in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, followed by a 1-year fellowship in reconstructive surgery. After finishing his residency at Emory, Dr. Glenn Maron has remained in Atlanta where he was a full-time faculty member at Emory until 1994. After leaving Emory, he continued his private practice in Atlanta.

He also worked for 6 years with the Atlanta Falcons and continues to work with the Atlanta Braves baseball team and as the Maxillofacial Surgeon for the Atlanta United MLS team. He remains the maxillo-facial trauma consultant for the NHL and is the past president of the Georgia Society of Oral and Maxillofacial surgery. Dr. Maron serves on the examination committee for the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons. He is a delegate for AAOMS. Finally in his spare time Dr. Maron has been appointed to the Georgia Board of Dentistry by Governor Kemp and is the Chairman of the Sedation committee for the State of Georgia.
